## ASSOCIATION MARKS 6TH YEAR

The Company G (RANGER) 75th Infantry Association will be celebrating its sixth year of existence by hosting its sixth consecutive reunion at Ft. Myers, Florida. Starting with a loose collection of 28 former LRRPs and Rangers at Sacramento, California, the Association has steadily grown to nearly 200 members and friends. While far from being the largest vet organization, the E/51 G/75 Association has rapidly made its presence known among Vietnam veteran organizations familiar with special operations.

The LRRPs and Rangers of the Americal Division first gained wide spread attention early Sunday morning in 1990 when a 10 minute special covering the first reunion was aired nationally on the CBS Charles Karault show. This CBS telecast poignantly captured the special bond and friendship that has fueled the Association over the past six years. At that first membership meeting held in the backyard of Dave Moncada's Sacramento home, the men vowed to maintain contact with each other through the creation of an Association. This they have done with extraordinary success.

Success has been marked by successive reunions, regular publications of the Sua Sponte newsletter, membership growth and support, and perhaps most importantly, the embracement of the Association by spouses and family members. Early on, it was decided that Association reunions would not be designed for the exclusive pleasure of LRRPs and Rangers but rather as a family oriented function in which wives, special others, children and friends would be welcomed. Whether by design, divine intervention or simple Ranger luck, this decision has emerged as one of the pillars of the Association's success where the thrill of reuniting at reunion sites are not reserved as private moments between LRRPs and Rangers, but instead extends across the gender and age barriers to include wives and family members as well. Without realizing it, an extended family was being created that would touch the lives of many.

The Association has been relentless in its search for its missing brothers. Starting with a hand written list of approximately fifty, the Association handbook has steadily grown each year and it currently list over five hundred former LRRPs and Rangers,

and new faces continue to show up at each reunion.

The success of the Association however has not been without its bumps and bruises, and tough lessons were learned along the way. The most difficult pill to swallow has been the need to come to grips with the corporate responsibilities of the Board and its Officers, and the economic realities of running the non-profit Association under tax exempt regulations. Investing time, personal funds in long distance phone conferences and a special Board meeting in Oklahoma, the Association leadership wrestled long and hard with it internal affairs. Eventually, a new philosophy took hold in which greater fiscal accountability is now emphasized as standard Association procedure.

Tremendous ground has been cover over the past six years, and the prospects for the future look bright. The Association has basked in the warmth of success and has weathers a few storms along the way. We are alive and well. We are in the company of great people. "Let's get on with the mission." Sua Sponte.

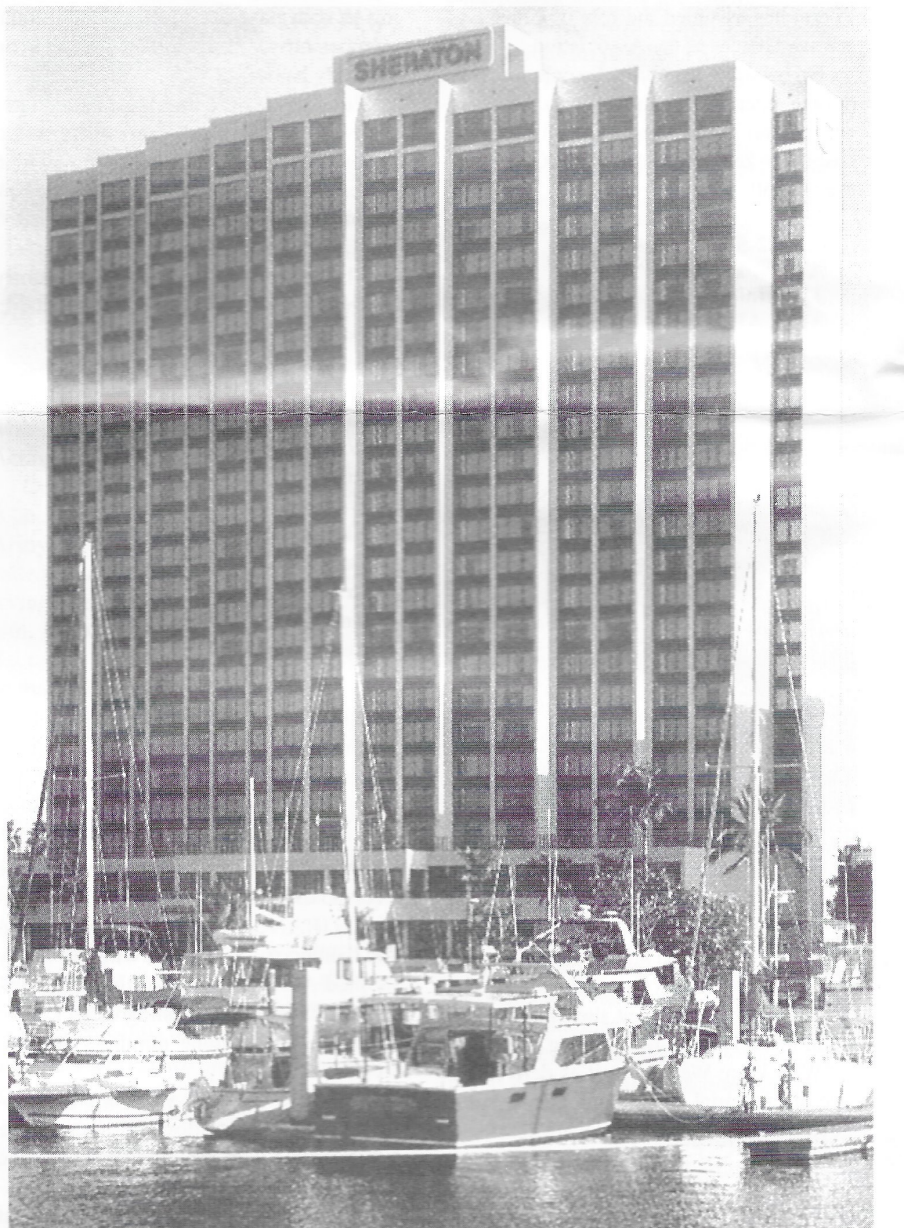
Nestled along the banks of the picturesque Caloosahatchee River in historic downtown Fort Myers, the hotel features a location that is convenient to the city as it is to the water. I-75 and State Road 80 are close by, and the Southwest International Airport is only 20 minutes away. For those planning to fly in, free transportation from the airport to the hotel is available.

100 hotel rooms have been blocked for the reunion. Special room rates are \$54, plus tax. Hotel reservation must be received by the Sheraton no later than 10 June. Reservation request beyond the cut-off date will be subject to availability. No charge for children occupying the same room as parents. Rollaway beds are \$15. per night. Cribs are available at no charge. The \$54. room rate will be available for three days prior and three days after reunion. Be sure to mention you are with the Co. G (RANGER) 75th Inf. Assoc. to get the special rate.

The hotel contains 417 rooms, including 234 jr. suites. All rooms are outfitted

with modern decor and with a bright Florida flair. The hotel's outdoor lounge is surrounded by tropical waterfalls, a covered spa, and Florida's largest hand painted mural. There are shops on premise, plus free covered parking and airport transportation.

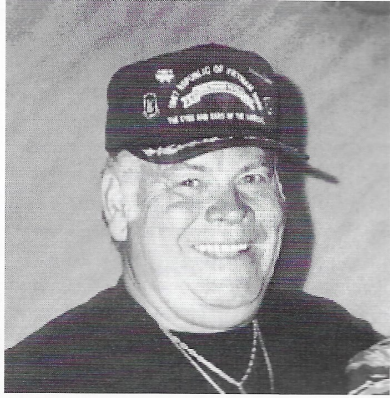

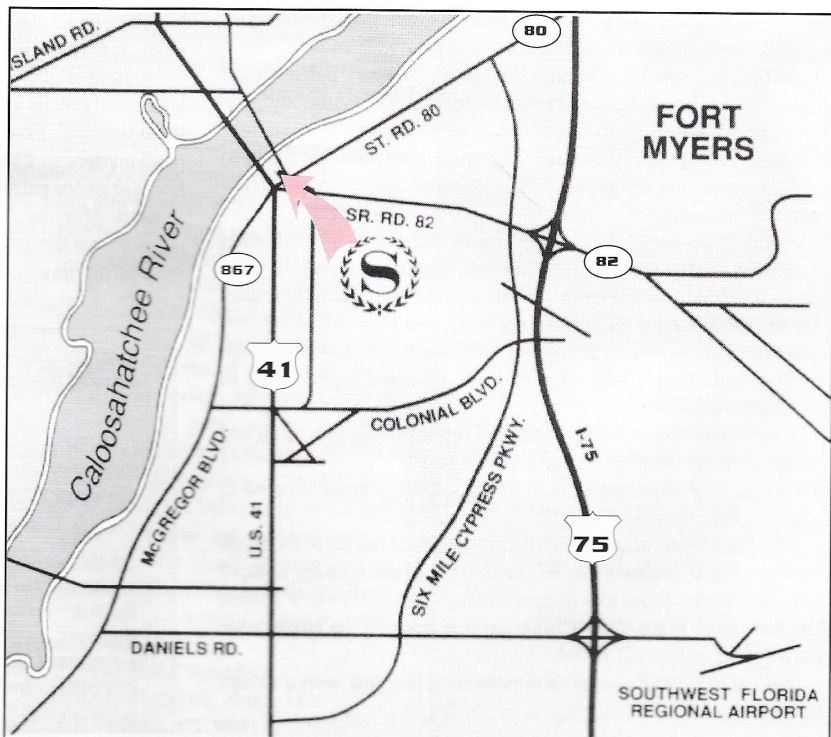

### SITREP, E-51

It didn't have a name when it began. Like Antietam or Pork Chop Hill, its significance would only be realized gradually, somewhere about half way through its happening. And then it *would* be given a name — the TET Offensive.

It began slowly at first — reports coming in from the patrols furthest out — ours and other LRRPs to the north in I Corps.... sightings of enemy movement, more than usual. And there was something different in what we were seeing this time. It wasn't VC. And it wasn't the usual NVA, moving from one position to another.

New khaki, short hair, heavy weapons, good food. Had to be reinforcements from the north. But not that many ... not yet.

They were doing a pretty good job of hiding what was coming in. Moving at night, small groups, about 8-10 men. One squad here, another a dozen clicks and three valleys away. But within a few days, our patrols were reporting more and more sightings. And I Corps and Americal G2 were beginning to come up with a rather unsettling picture.

It looked like this might be developing into something.... But what? Were they planning to hit a particular unit? Or could this possibly be some kind of major offensive?

G2 called a meeting of company commanders and briefed us on what they knew and didn't know, mostly from LRRP and over-flight reports.

The Division went on full alert. And it was saddle-up time for E-51. Until now, we'd been operating on our normal schedule — about two-thirds of the men in the field, the other third recuperating and preparing for the next mission.

But G2 wanted blanket coverage now — every patrol in the field. We didn't hold back even one in reserve. Al Whitcomb, our First Shirt, was left pretty much watching over a ghost town, taking care of the men as they came in, and helping them get ready to go back out as quickly as possible — no more than a day and a half between missions.

Within a week the NVA were getting bolder, taking more chances at moving during the day, figuring that the triple canopy in most places would hide them from the over-flights. But I think it finally dawned on them that they had something else to worry about, because our patrols were starting to pound the hell out of them with artillery and, if we could catch them in the open, were calling in gunships and jets.

At the same time, we were getting reports of heavy fighting and positions being overrun up north in I Corps. It kept getting more intense, and then suddenly it all seemed to come together in a single night.

The LRRPs were stretched the full length of the division, ranging from about five to ten miles out in front of the infantry companies. We were seeing lots of movement, some good-sized forces. The hills were lit up like a Christmas tree from all the artillery we were calling in.

And then, toward dawn, it was over. They just weren't there anymore.

There would be more fighting, of course, in the days that followed ... some heavy stuff by the infantry companies. But the big push, at least in our sector, was over.

A number of units up north took some bad hits. But the Americal was mostly okay, and I came off patrol the next morning with quiet thankfulness. First, because the NVA never made it to Division headquarters in Chu Lai. But more immediately and profoundly because every patrol made it home. And I can see them even now ... tired, grinning ... coming down the road, one patrol, and then another, and the guys who'd already got in ... whooping and cheering and running out to hug the guys just coming in. You did good, LRRPs. Real good.

### KILLER SIMPSON

It was routine for the NVA/VC to shell MAG 13's Airfield at Chu Lai during the pre dawn hours. Since our area was about a half mile to the east, most of the attacks were ignored and we snoozed on.

During the kickoff of the TET '68 Offensive, Bob Simpson followed the same procedure when rounds started impacting in the distance. Now Simpson was a First Class LRRP and a brave soldier and warrior. Like most of us in the tropical climate, he had about as much use for underwear as he did for leprosy.

Shortly after the rounds started impacting in the distance, KABOOM, a 122mm rocket hit close, damn close. Ole Killer Simpson jumped straight up in the air, grabbed his web gear and rifle, then made a super fast bee line for the nearest bunker.

later, the gooks finally got tired of shooting at us, so they switched to MAG13's huge bomb dump which blew up like Bill when he found Al in Hillery's bedroom. It was one hell of a bang. The concussion was terrific.

After the big bang, Ole Killer looked out of the bunker and saw a mushroom cloud. Now this boy was one hell of a LRRP, but nobody ever accused him of being a rocket scientist. He thought the cloud was nuclear. Not knowing what else to do, He tied a cravat over his nose and mouth like a bandit.

Soon Captain Bjork came through the area advising everyone that the attack was over. I exited my bunker in time to see Killer Simpson, America's finest, crawl out of the bunker naked as a jay bird, wearing his web gear, rifle and mask.

Ole Killer still gets razzed about that one. His bunker mates swear there were no whips and chains.

### YEAR OF THE MONKEY

1968, it was the best of times, it was the worst of times. Some of us were already serving in Vietnam. Others of us were in boot camp, doing state side duty or still in civilian life, still at the threshold of our individual journeys that would take us to the beach at Chu Lai.

Back in the world the Beatles had released Sgt. Pepper the year before and were changing the music world forever. Marijuana, Woodstock, free love and riots swept across the country.

In Vietnam, the ancient capital city of Hue underwent a siege for 25 days. 150 U.S. Marines and 400 ARVNs are killed, along with an estimated 5000 enemy soldiers. The battle of Khesanh is brought into America's living room each night by the media. The U.S. Embassy in Saigon is over run. American troop strength in Vietnam tops over half a million soldiers.

Politically, Lyndon Johnson startled the world by announcing that he will not seek, nor accept the Democratic Party's nomination for another term as President. Presidential candidate Senator Bobby Kennedy and civil rights leader Martin Luther King Jr. are killed by assassins. Nixon is elected President.

It was the best of times, it was the worst of times. As these events swirled around us, a full moon subtly and slowly rose over the horizon to illuminate the Asian skies and signal the beginning of the Chinese Lunar New Year. It was called the Year of the Monkey and would historically mark the beginning of the 1968 Tet Offense.

Recognized as one of the pivotal point in the war, Sua Sponte begins the first of several newsletter publications featuring stories and commentary pertaining the 1968 Tet Offense. Where were you, what do you remember about Tet, what were you doing at this time? ## TWENTY FIVE YEARS AFTER

Over a three day period in December of 1994, educators, journalist, poets, doctors, retired military, newsmen, and others of both American and Vietnamese background gathered to participate in a Tulane University conference entitled, "My Lai 25 Years After: Facing the Darkness, Healing the Wound."

According to information received about the conference, the gathering focused on the social, political and historic effects of the My Lai atrocities, and emphasized "healing the wounds" of this dark and tragic episode of the war.
