

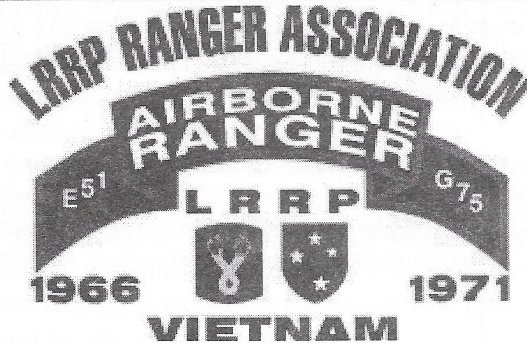

All submitted photos will be returned if requested. Authorship and photo credits will be provided. Submittal of written articles may be hand written, typed or on computer disk. We can translate most files. Macintosh is preferred.

Deadlines: Sua Sponte is published quarterly in March, June, September and December. Absolute deadlines for submitting material for the newsletter is the first of each month identified above. Time sensitive material will take precedence. Send material to the Sua Sponte address in Bemidji, Mn.

I'm writing to you to discuss Association dues.

When I became President, I learned that the Association has about 140 (or so) active dues paying Members, and that we distribute about 450 copies of *Sua Sponte* – our newsletter - every quarter. This means that there's about 300 people receiving *Sua Sponte*, the majority of whom were members of our unit in Vietnam, but who are not now paying dues. If your dues are current, your involvement and commitment to the Association and your fellow LRRPs and Rangers are appreciated. On the other hand, if you were a Member of the Association, but your Membership has lapsed, or if you've simply forgotten to renew, I'm appealing to your personal interests in asking that you renew your Membership. Or, if you were a member of our unit, but never joined the Association, consider doing so now by submitting an application along with the requisite dues.

The bottom line is that the Association is really only the aggregate of its members, and for all the high purposes for which the Association was founded, the Association exists, in my view, primarily for two purposes. The first is to facilitate bringing the members of our unit together once again, and the other is to maintain the flow of pertinent information to all of those who were part of our unit. There are only about 500 human beings in the world who are qualified to be in this Association. The common denominator is that we all served at one time or another in the 196th LRRPs, E51st LRP, or G75th Rangers in Vietnam. Our bond is our collective experiences with each other at that time in our lives. But, the Association can survive and fulfill these objectives only as long as its Members and those who are eligible to be Members support it. And their commitment and willingness to support the goals for which the Association was formed are evidenced by the dues they pay.

The question may arise as to what does dues paying get you. Well, for one thing, there are the quarterly issues of *Sua Sponte*. I've heard *Sua Sponte* described as the lifeline of the Association to its Members. The fact is that there is no other channel of communication dedicated to getting information out to everyone in the Association. *Sua Sponte* is there for all the Members, and not just for the Association to disseminate information. Stories, reminiscences, letters to the editor, etc., are always being sought from the Members and are welcome. Announcements are made and articles about our reunions and get-togethers appear regularly. It's important to insure that we continue this important function.

And of course, the paying of dues makes you a full Member of the Association, entitled to vote on actions and issues affecting it, and you.

There's no Electoral College here; no courts; no chads; no dimples; every vote counts! And with such a relatively small number of Members, or persons eligible to be Members, every vote is meaningful.

So, I'm asking for those who served with the unit, but who are not now Members, or whose membership has lapsed, to step up and support their friends and comrades by supporting the Association.

March 3rd, 2000

I had met Steve Lemire at "packbacker town", De Than Street, Saigon, in the hot summer day, quite randomly. Steve was a member of an American veteran group who had returned to visit old battlefields in Vietnam. The visit was part of the nonprofit-tour named, "Quest For Healing" organized by Walter Bacak, a former Ranger of the 1st Brigade, 101st Air Cavalry Division, which serve all PTSD veterans in America. The t-shirt that Steve wore had the Americal logo in front with familiar name under it: LRRP Ranger Association, E 51st-G75th, Viet Nam 66-71 which completely refreshed my memories.

Oh, God! I finally have found someone from one of my unit. Steve was surprised (eyes wide open) when I asked, "Do you know Danny Jacks of the Americal LRRP? He was my Team Leader." Steve told me Jacks was still alive and has a huge chicken ranch in Arkansas. Steve answered in the mood of being amazed as if he couldn't believe his ears that after so many years the war had ended, but still this Vietnamese asked him about the name of famous Danny Jacks, who had saved his life, right in ...Saigon.

From an email address of Jacks that Steve Lemire sent to me, Jacks and I reconnected the friendship by email after almost 30 years of being apart. Since that time, every memory of Team Oregon's mission; especially in hell-hole places as Tra Bong, Bia Vuc jungles (Quang Ngai Province) and those joys and tears with friends in LZ Bronco, 11th Brigade, Jacks recalled all in his daily email to me... to not only has brought real comfort to situation, it has also erased all sadness, shameful... that existed after my 7 years in labor camp, 8 years of unemployment...and a life of living next to the Communist; those devils are always trying to depress my freedoms in whatever chances they had.

Danny and Marcell Jacks and other American friends informed me that all were trying to help me to immigrate to America... from the on, I couldn't keep peace within myself any longer and with questions: How are they going to do that? How long do I have to wait... for my dream to come true? In the hot days or quiet nights in Saigon, I had the feeling in my vision that my friends hands were reaching out from different directions and everything stopped right in front of my face. But my dear God, I was unable to touch either one of the lovely hands. Jacks continued in his email to me: Rangers never leave friends behind. One more time, I realized that I had fought side-by-side with loyal friends.

June 26th, 2000

I finally came to America, a journey with so many incredible details, a miracle trip not for an unfaithful person to listen to. I do believe that all has been a results of continuous prayers to God for me from Danny and Marcell Jacks, from the story in email that I showed to Vietnamese friends that made them decide to help me out of country with one week! From the window of interview at the US Consulate in HCMC on June 21st, 2000, then going through the custom gate of Tan Son Nhat Airport on June 26th 2000 and safely flew on a flight of Eve Air to Los Angeles in the rush season that two days before my departure I had been told there were no seats available in every airline until the 31st of July.

July 4th, 2000

Unbelievably, here I am now sitting next to the friend now weighing more that 200 lbs. and listening to his recall about his Viet Nam experiences; serving in the army; remembering the beautiful country of Southeast Asia, some million miles away from Arkansas; or worrying about the gate of all good friends there... and his personal feelings that were hard to share with his fellow neighbors in Rison, Arkansas, about the downfall of the South Vietnamese Army on April 30th, 1975.

Marcell said Danny has always tried to make his family, his friends there in Rison to understand what America had contributed for the sake of ... Vietnamese's freedom as main topic in every conversation, including Vietnamese friends that the Jack's love... and something about me through his heart: a Non-Commissioned Officer ARVN (Army Republic of Vietnam) interpreter who was graduated from AFLS (Armed Forces Languages School) in 1966. I said to myself, "Surely that war hero Danny Jacks had so many times retold the unforgettable war stories." And then, when I, a strange Vietnamese, first shows up in Rison, after a hand shake with a friendly resident there, he or she immediately knew that I was Danny's buddy since the 70's.

To me, while a guest at the Jack's Ranch, I was a live witness to let people there, in every meeting, to comprehend through my words how my dear friend, that very Jacks himself (needless to describe how brave Danny was at the time) and other American warriors who had fought so gallant to defeat the Communists... in an absolutely strange battlefield.

Jacks said most of all young men returned from Vietnam: Steve Lemire (Alaska); Robert Wells (Michigan).... all had paid for their volunteer to Vietnam to fight for the freedom of my country; some affected by PTSD (Post Traumatic Stress Disorder). That psychological illness has led a number of veterans to different types of tragedies: suicide; drugs; ...and until this moment, that invisible demon still causes uneasiness in the heart of 270,000 veterans and inside the sleeping souls of 50,000 names on the Wall and countless veterans buried across America.

We had only one worry. That we would have lost an arm, a leg, or both to the VC. But I had often told my team members, if that unfortunate situation were to happen to me, do not hesitate to finish my life... as quickly as possible. This was the rule of Team Oregon and, as far as I know, was a rule of every LRRP Team. I now am feeling sorry for what had been done during the years of 69-71 and still now achieving the freedom for Vietnam. However, as men, we wouldn't have regrets for that, but must focus into our next generation by giving them all updated knowledge, instead of war weapons theory as before, I do truly believe that the world history of the 21st century will be noted that the last victory must belong to us.

July 5th, 2000

The Jacks have paid much respect to the Vietnamese Boatman and considered my case the same. Danny and Marcell had taken me to the INS in Memphis, Tennessee, Department of Labor in Arkansas for sponsoring and legalizing my visa status. In the sponsor letter to USINS TSC in Mesquite, Texas, Danny Wrote: *My friend was a South Vietnamese soldier during the Vietnam war. After the war, he served several years in labor camp. He has been persecuted and discriminated against every day of his life. Since he has no hope for a future in his native land, he is seeking a life free of persecution and to be allowed his freedom. I have offered Le Thanh Giai a job here, where he can pursue his freedom and livelihood.*

Marcell said she and her kids were proud of Danny. After 20 years of working, the Jacks have a chicken ranch in joint venture with KFC, planning for palm trees, a nice house...a daughter and a son and two lovely grandchildren. The Jacks family believe in God and are living next to wonderful neighbors. Danny said, "We enjoy the wonderful life that America has granted to us and it is not difficult to improve our living environment."

In Rison, everyone is out for hunting season, exchanging working days for each other nearby ranches... a peaceful life in a beautiful community. For my country's friends and for the Jacks, I have only resided 20 days in the "promised land", but seem as I have already seen America... from the heart of my friends in Rison Arkansas.

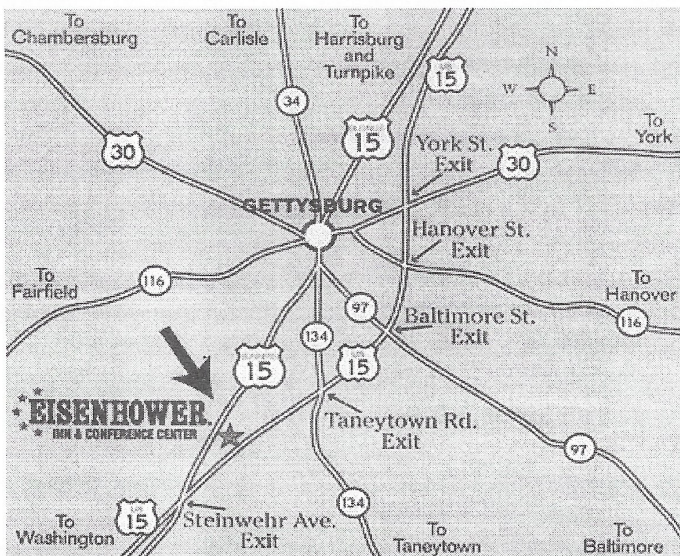
2001 Gettysburg Gathering *by Earl Toomey-Chairman of 2001 Gathering*

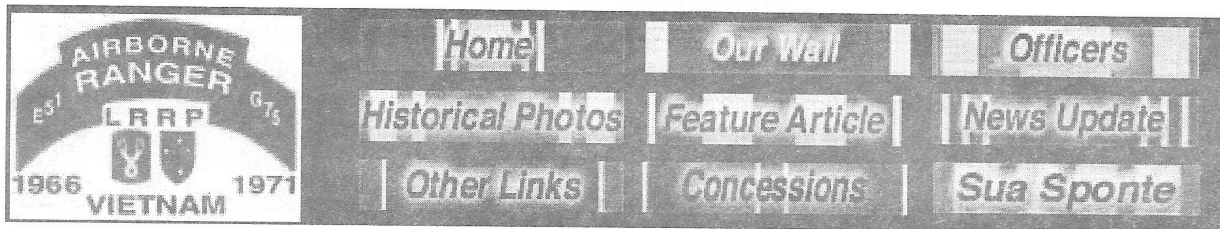

A Search for the families of "Our Fallen Comrades"



"Our Fallen Comrades"! What a broad title for a group of so valiant soldiers –LRRPs/Rangers, each and every one of them, who unselfishly gave it their all. Our fallen comrades started out as members of our teams, fellow hooch-mates; however, as time went on, they grew to be a part of us. Together we shared the good times and the bad; we shared times of laughter and tears. They, like us today, lived far away, so far away from that war and country which brought us together for a short slice of time in our lives and history. And now...we should try to make contact with their families and tell them just how much they meant to us. No one can replace the thoughts that remind us of them...they were all very special in their own way. As association members, we should also make every effort possible to bind the ties anew which that war has broken, and gather the remnants of our scattered family members.

Call it closure if you will, or, call it a healing process; regardless, this effort should prove to be a rewarding experience, both for those who were left behind when they lost that son, brother or father, and for us, who lost our teammate(s), and or, buddy(ies). We should include their family members on our mailing list, invite them to our reunions and share our special memories with them.

However, I need assistance in this project – I need your input and help. I ask that you review the list of our fallen comrades shown below and remember what you can about them; where they were from and what you can about their family members. Did they have a brother/sister; who was their dad/mom - where did they live? Any scrap of information could prove to be of aid in this search. Pull out those old photos; remember who was their friend back then on the sands of Chu Lai, or...who was it that they talked to about home. Don't sell your information short, your thoughts and remembrances may be the key needed to reach that lost family member. Like the wagon wheel with its many spokes that connect to a hub – here, in this situation, your information could be the spoke that will connect to the hub – and serve to bring us together as a LRRP/Ranger family.

As mentioned above, here is the listing of our fallen comrades. I listed all by name, unit designation at the time of KIA, home of record (HOR) and date of their KIA status. Remember that when we were a non-divisional unit with the Americal Division, deaths were reported with a particular Bde's area of operation. E.g.: if up north then with the 196th LIB, central, then with the 198th LIB and when south, the 11th LIB – so the unit designation may not be of issue in this case. I need help here!

*2 We have a Brooks, Steven H. listed on our wall – the VN Memorial Wall has a Brooks, Steven K. (1Lt); same fellow??? The Brooks on the VN wall gives a HOR of Dade City, FL, can any one confirm that this is indeed our man, and if so, was that was his place of residence? Need some help here!

Nash Reunion Survey

Early returns from the survey sent out from Tom Nash, president of our association communicated needs that the officers and board members should focus on for our gatherings and reunions.

1. It is important that we rotate, as we had established before, our reunions from East Coast, to West Coast, to Central U.S., etc. on a consistent basis (important to note that we have reunions every-other year <even number years> and gatherings "hitchhiking" with other organizations on odd-numbered years). This year (2001) is a hitchhike year for our gathering; 2002 will be our reunion out West.

2. Secondly, besides following the rotation, most early responses wanted a vertical movement, either from north to south, or south to north, in each area of the country (shake it up and down) for reunion locations within each region.

3. Also, there have been suggestions that we do a "buffet style" dinner. The rationale for this is that it would give everyone an opportunity to break bread (pass gas) with each other at a common meal for our reunion. The cost of the buffet, as suggested, would be much cheaper than that of a formal sit-down dinner, but would allow a *togetherness* at a meal.

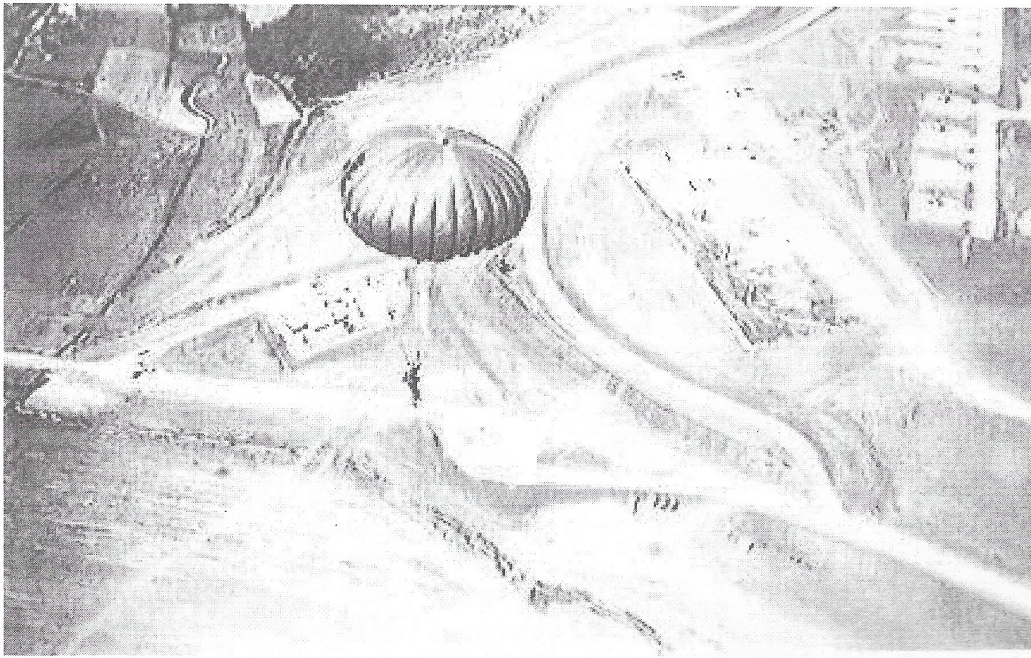
